Course Description

This course is an Introduction to American Government and is designed to provide a foundation for understanding and participating in the American political system. We will examine the theoretical ideas that informed the creation and development of America's political system and consider some of the major contemporary challenges to the maintenance of American democracy. Upon successful completion of this course, students should be able to: 1) understand the origins and nature of the constitutional system 2) appreciate the relationship between the development of the legislative, executive, and judicial branches 3) understand basic social science theories concerning political behavior, bureaucracies, interest groups, and political parties 4) understand how social scientists explain and understand social and political processes 5) write thesis-based persuasive essays 6) understand how policy throughout the history of the United States has affected our current state; and 7) understand the importance of milestone events throughout our history.
