Art 215: Art History: Prehistoric to Renaissance

Objective:

Introduce students to the history, methods, and reasons for art-making from the Prehistoric to Renaissance eras.

We begin our journey at the end of the last ice age exploring prehistoric caves, then follow the growth of civilizations and their unique cultures defined by the art they left behind. We will follow a timeline that embraces a global approach.

- 1. The Growth of Civilization: Following the current historical timeline, we trace man's movement across the world as cave dwellers, hunters and gatherers, first settlements, and the creation of empires.
- 2. Art and Its Influence on Culture: First, we ponder the meaning of art and how its meaning shifts through history. We compare time periods and cultures and how visual imagery and text were used to communicate life in these communities, which were both unique and cross-cultural.
- **3.** Historical Artistic Methods and Styles: Students work with historical methods of making art and engage in projects that compare styles of various cultures around the globe.
- 4. Modern-day Reinterpretation Final Project: Students select and research a past work of art, looking for common connections that merge historical and modern cultural perspectives. Each student will craft a new work of art combining the old and new and write a short supporting paper outlining their ideas.

Projects: Additional exercises/projects may be added

Pre-history art:

Mysteries in Stone - Using simulated wall segments, use charcoal and earth tone Conté crayons to draw animals, patterns, and people in the style seen on prehistoric cave walls, rock carvings, and passageways worldwide.

Great civilizations:

Write like an Egyptian: Papyrus Scroll – Write your name in hieroglyphics on papyrus and create a small Egyptian illustration that will be rolled up into a scroll.

Asian textile & artistic philosophy:

Drape Yourself in Art: Shibori - Shibori is a Japanese resist hand-dying method. The resulting patterns are often emblematic of Japan's appreciation of the beauty of imperfection – known locally as wabi-sabi.

1000's of years of painting – still with us:

Michelangelo's legacy – painting frescos: Ever wonder how the Sistine Chapel was created? Fresco is a technique of mural painting on freshly laid plaster. We'll explore this on a smaller scale to see if we can paint like Michelangelo.

Midterm/Final Project:

Modern-day Reinterpretation of Art - Research a past work of art/civilization, find a connection, and merge historical and modern cultural perspectives. Combine the old/new as an art object: painting, sculpture, collage, etc. Write a short supporting paper outlining your idea. Midterm – Review concepts and sketches. **Final** – Turn in the final art object.

- Projects 100 pts each, letter grade 4 projects per semester (number may vary) 400 pts (60%)
- Midterm and Final 125 pts each, letter grade 250 pts (40%)
- Exercises TBD exercises will be scattered throughout the course, most earning complete/incomplete (25pts)
- Project Grades on Canvas On/before the deadline Step 1: The instructor reviews your original work in class.
 Step 2: Photo upload of project/exercise to Canvas. You will receive a grade once complete.
