Acting I is a preliminary level acting course exploring the fundamentals of theatre through voice, movement and scripted materials. Primarily for Theatre majors.

# Course Purpose:

All people are performers. Every day we "present" a different side of ourselves to the various persons with whom we come in contact. We are all skilled at a kind of "deception" which allows us to transform our voices and our bodies as needed to get what we want. As children, we learn what works and what doesn't in our interactions with adults. These become ingrained in us. In this course, we remind ourselves what our different sides consist of, we learn strategies for acquiring our needs, we learn to relate to each other, to sympathize and even empathize with people different from ourselves. We become better citizens in a global society. In the study of acting we learn to be better sociologists, psychologists, public speakers, athletes, managers, anthropologists, parents, children, friends. In short, we learn much more about the human condition in order to reflect it to others

Required Text: None/Supplied via instructor

Fall/Spring 3-credit lecture or seminar course, face-to-face

Over 15 weeks, students will spend 150 minutes per week in lectures, class discussions, and examinations (37.5 hours for the semester). Instructional time includes a 3-hour final exam. Out- of-class work includes homework and preparation for exams and quizzes and is estimated at around 300 minutes per week (75 hours for the semester).

### Academic Integrity:

#### Class attendance:

Since timelines and presence are crucial to excellence in the performing arts, I have adopted the following attendance policy: Each student is allowed 3 absences before your final grade is affected. For each absence beyond these allotted absences, the student's overall course grade will be reduced by 1/2 grade with each subsequent absence. In addition, three tardies or early exits will equal one absence. Participation in official university business must be documented by a written notice from the sponsoring faculty or staff member. A student who is absent from classes for official university business day shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment scheduled within a reasonable time. The instructor will also be noting tardies and early exits from class. Three of these will equal one unexcused absence. **Absences in excess of 3 weeks of attendance for a course (9 for MWF, 6 for TTH) will result in an instructor initiated drop.** 

#### Content Disclosure:

Content in the arts can sometimes include works, situations, actions, and language that can be offensive to some students on the grounds of sexual explicitness, violence, or blasphemy. As I am devoted to the principle of freedom of expression, artistic and otherwise, and it is not common practice to censor these works on any of these grounds, students who might feel unduly distressed or made uncomfortable by such expressions should withdraw at the start of the term and seek another course.

### Assignments:

Monologue Performance- Students will perform a memorized monologue that has been scored and rehearsed with Stanislavski Method acting techniques and guided practice. 200 pts / 25% of final grade (PLO 1, 2, and 4)

Scene Performance- Students will perform as a group in 2 memorized scenes that have been rehearsed inside and outside of class with guidance and input from the instructor. **300 pts / 50% of final grade (PLO 1, 2, and 4)** 

Mock Audition- Students will put into practice the skills which they have learned this semester by preparing two contrasting pieces to perform in a mock audition without assistance or input from the instructor and be graded on their performance. 200 pts / 25% of final grade (PLO 1, 2, and 4)

### **Program Learning Outcomes:**

- 1. Students will learn a firm foundation in language, theory, terminology and ideology that reflects the standard concepts used in theatre. USLO- I, II, III
- 2. Students will learn how to prepare for the professional world of theatre in which they will be able to display competencies in the following areas: Performance, Musical Theatre performance, production, directing and design. Students will demonstrate an understanding of character, motivation and objective which will be evident in their final projects and presentations performed in their performance or design class. USLO- I,II,III
- 3. Students will demonstrate appropriate critical and creative thinking as well as writing and research skills in theatre history. Students will have a basic understanding of major theatre movements throughout history and how they interact, effected or reacted to their own culture. USLO I,II,III, IV
- 4. Students will be able to identify different genres and styles of dramatic literature and be able to evaluate, synthesize and create dramatic plays and scenes- USLO-I, II, III, IV
